An intensive exploration of Rome's urban topography during the Republican and Imperial periods, from the 8th century BCE to the rise of Constantine in the early 4th century CE. Using archaeological and textual sources, including the Etruscan and Roman collections of the Penn Museum, the goal will be to gain a thorough understanding of how the appearance of the ancient Rome changed over the course of 1200 years. What is the archaeological evidence for Aeneas, Romulus, and Remus?; how did the face of the city change as the armies of Hannibal approached during the Second Punic War?; what happened to the fire codes after Nero's conflagration in 64 CE?; how was the city transformed from paganism to Christianity in the early 4th c. CE? The course will also feature comparative material from Pompeii, Herculaneum, Ostia, and Aphrodisias.

Midterm, Thursday, March 1 **20%**

Final Exam, Monday, May 7 **25%**

There will be two oral and written assignments for the course in addition to the midterm and final.

1) During the semester, each student will give a short (5 minute) oral report on a monument/artifact associated with an object or group of objects in the Etruscan or Roman gallery in the Penn Museum, followed by a 3-5 page paper based on that report. The topic should be identified by **Thursday, Feb. 13**. This will be worth **20%** of the grade.

2) A short (10 minute) talk on a subject associated with the archaeology of Rome, which will be the basis for a 7-8 page paper due Tuesday, April 23 (suggested topics will be handed out). These can also be critiques of films dealing with ancient Rome. The talks will be given during the last full week of class (April 19), and should be delivered in the classroom. The paper is worth **20%** of the grade, and the talk is **10%**.

Class Participation: 5%. Attendance in class and discussion of the monuments is fundamental, since much has not been published in English, and in many cases, the archaeological evidence remains unpublished.


