COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Socialism has become a hot topic in US politics. Some advocate it as an ideology that supports economic equality; others decry it as a path towards excessive state control. But what does the word socialism really mean? Why does it mean different things to different people? How did it develop historically? Which countries identify with socialism and why? Is socialism opposed to capitalism or complementary to it? This course takes a global perspective on socialism as a socio-economic system. It explores how socialism developed in theory and practice in dozens of countries worldwide, with an emphasis on Western democracies such as France, Germany, Great Britain, and the US, as well developing countries such as China and Rwanda. It follows the rise of a democratic path to socialism after the Second World War, the neoliberal turn of the 1980s, and contemporary debates and policy proposals.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Attendance and Participation: 15%

Students are required to attend class and participate in class discussions and projects. No use of electronic devices permitted during class time.

Midterm: 25%

An in-class midterm exam will cover socialism in theory and practice.

Final: 25%

An in-person final exam will cover public policy analysis of new socialist programs.

Paper: 35%

In the final paper, students will provide a detailed assessment of a socialist policy proposal in any country that may be one of the ones discussed in class or another one, with the instructor's permission. Topics must be approved by the instructor. No use of AI permitted.
